## Show Rules and Conditions

1. The object of Swallowfield Horticultural Society is to promote interest in gardening matters. The Show is held under R.H.S rules except for children's classes and where under the schedule they obviously do not apply.
ALL CLASSES ARE OPEN

## Please read your schedule carefully before entering as any incorrect entries will be disqualified. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to ensure that their entry corresponds with the class description.

2. All exhibits in the Horticultural Classes must be grown or produced by exhibitors in their own gardens or allotments. Pot plants should have been in the possession of the exhibitor for at least 3 months prior to the show. Unless specified, pots should not exceed 22 cm measured inside the rim of the pot. Any pot plant likely to exceed 50 cm in any dimension must be notified to the Entries Secretary on the Entry Form. Eggs must be from the exhibitor's own livestock. Handicrafts and cookery must be the exhibitor's own work. Any person breaking these rules will be barred from exhibiting.
Exhibitors up to age 16. This group may exhibit in adult classes, provided that they are growing their own exhibits in a separate area from that of the adult.
3. ALL EXHIBITS MUST BE STAGED BY 9.15AM ON SUNDAY $27^{H}$ AUGUST AND MAY NOT BE REMOVED UNTIL 5.00PM ON MONDAY 298h AUGUST. Staging can take place between 6.00 pm and 8.00 pm on Saturday and from 7.30 am to 9.15 am on Sunday. All exhibits must be clean and in a fit state to be placed on the show benches. Any exhibitor who needs to bring a vehicle on to the showground to deliver/collect entries must obtain a pass. Your Vehicle Pass will now be given to you with your Class Cards and will not be available on the gate. This pass must be displayed in the car windscreen and will be valid up to 10.30 am on the Sunday and after 4.45 pm on the Monday. Entries may be removed after 5.00 pm on Monday.
4. A Novice is an exhibitor who has not yet won 3 Firsts in a novice class against other competitors, or a First in any other class.
5. No competitor may enter more than one exhibit per class.
6. Craft items and photographs must not have been previously exhibited in this show.

Any oversized photographs will not be judged
7. Gardens and allotments may be visited by a member of the committee after entries are received.
8. The Show Committee will appoint Judges whose decisions shall be final. They are empowered to withhold prizes if, in their opinion, entries are of insufficient merit.
9. Entries by Wednesday $23^{\text {rd }}$ August 2023
10. Exhibitors must obtain a Class Card from the Entries Secretary in the marquee for each entry. The card must be placed face down with the exhibit after staging.
11. Challenge Cups and shields are for competition and cannot be won outright. Winners may have their name and date engraved on their trophies at their own expense. The Society is no longer able to do this. They should be returned to the trophy steward by $1^{\text {st }}$ July 2023 in a clean condition. Telephone No 07554426255
12. The Committee, while exercising reasonable care, accepts no responsibility for loss or damage to exhibits or property during the show. The Society reserves the right to accept or refuse entries without necessarily stating a reason.
13. In this schedule the words 'kinds' and 'varieties' are used in the following sense. Peas and potatoes are 'kinds' of vegetables; Epicure and Eclipse are 'varieties' of potatoes.
14. Points are awarded as follows:

FIRST-5 points SECOND-3 points THIRD-1 point
If a tie results, the award will be decided on the greatest number of first prizes; if still a tie, the greatest number of second prizes etc. In the case of children's classes, it is sometimes possible to have a tie even with this system. If this should occur, after applying the greatest number of firsts, seconds, and thirds criteria, the prize will be shared.
15. No cards showing the name of seedsmen shall be displayed on the show benches until judging has finished, but varieties may be named.
16. Any protest must be made in writing to the Secretary by 2.00 pm on the day of judging, accompanied by a deposit of $£ 1.00$. If this protest is upheld the deposit will be refunded.
17. EXHIBITS NOT TO BE DISPOSED OF BY US MUST BE RESERVED AT TIME OF STAGING.
Exhibits not reserved may be given to a local charity or sold on site by auction. If any funds are obtained, they will go for the benefit of a local charity. However, it is not our custom to dispose of any craft, cookery, or floral art exhibits without the express permission of the competitor.
18. Vases and display boards will be supplied and must be used.

19 All trophies and awards will be presented at approximately 5.00 pm on Monday.
20. The definition of a child is a person of 16 years and under.

When you sign the entry form for any class in this schedule, it will be assumed that you have read, understand and agree to be bound by these conditions of entry.

FOR THE BENEFIT OF EXHIBITORS, The R.H.S. 2016 points system is as follows. This can be found in the R.H.S Show handbook which can be seen at the Secretary's table. The exhibition value of an entry is governed by the difficulty of its production. Judging is therefore based on a maximum number of points per entry.

Jam, jelly and chutney jars must have no commercial markings. Jams and jellies may have a plain twist top, a pliable press-on top or a wax disc covered with a cellophane top. No wax disc is needed with a twist or plastic top. Chutneys and all vinegar preserves must be 3 months old and be presented in an unbranded jar with a vinegar proof lid and filled to between $3 \mathrm{~mm} \& 6 \mathrm{~mm}$ from top of jar

241) Orange and Apricot Loaf Cake (winner of last year's open cake class, Beth Rutterford Ingredients:-175g unsalted butter, softened, plus extra for greasing. 175 g dried apricots, chopped. Zest of 2 large oranges, juice of 1.175 g golden caster sugar. 3 medium eggs beaten. 280 g self-raising flour. drop of milk (optional). 50 g Icing sugar. Method:- Heat oven to $160^{\circ} \mathrm{C} / 140^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ fan/Gas 3 . Grease and line a 900 g loaf tin with baking parchment. In a saucepan, heat the apricots with the orange zest and all but one tbsp of the juice, and set aside to cool. Beat the butter and sugar in a bowl until light and fluffy, gradually beat in the eggs then fold in the flour. Stir in the cooled apricots. If the mixture is dry at this stage, add a drop of milk. Scrape the batter into the tin and smooth the top. Bake for 50 mins to an hour until a skewer inserted into the middle, comes out clean. Cool in the tin for 10 mins before removing, then leave on a wire rack to cool completely. Add the remaining orange juice to the icing sugar stirring until smooth and slightly runny. Drizzle the icing in a zig zag pattern over the top of the cake and leave to set.

Boiled Fruit cake to recipe
Ingredients: 100 g margarine, 150 g sugar (light brown), 150 g currants, 150 g sultanas, 50 g candied peel, 220 ml water, 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda, 1 heaped tsp mixed spice, 2 beaten eggs, 100 g plain flour, 100 g SR flour, pinch of salt.
Method: Place margarine, sugar, currants, sultanas, peel, water, bicarb. and mixed spice in a pan and simmer for 1 minute. Pour into a large bowl and allow to cool. Line a 20.5 cm round tin with greased grease-proof paper. Add eggs, flours and salt to bowl. Mix well and pour into tin. Bake in the centre of oven for about $1 \frac{1}{4}$ hour, $180^{\circ} \mathrm{C} /$ Gas 4.

Method: Heat butter and honey together over a gentle heat, allow to just simmer for 1 minute to emulsify mixture. Allow to cool. Add whisked eggs and flour. Mixture will be like thick batter. (Thin with a little milk if necessary.) Pour into a greased and lined 20 cm ( 8 inch) round cake tin, cook for 45 to 75 mins do not open door until it appears cooked. Pre heat oven to 150 C . Timing is for conventional oven and is a guide only as appliances vary. Display on plate or board, protected with film or 'clear panel baker's bag'.
H12) Honey Fudge exhibits must be made to this recipe Ingredients: 454 g granulated sugar, 140 ml evaporated milk, 57 g honey, 57 g butter, a good pinch of salt
Method 1. In a very large saucepan, boil the sugar, salt and milk for 5 minutes. 2. Add the honey and re-boil the mixture until a "soft ball" stage is reached at $115^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$. Add the butter to the mixture and allow to stand until it is lukewarm. 3. Beat the mixture until it is creamy, and spread into a greased dish. When it is nearly set, cut the fudge into squares. Display 6 pieces on a plate or board protected with film or 'clear panel bag'.
H13) Beeswax Wrap, two matching pieces. Each 30 cm square. Made from fabric and Beeswax only, no additional oils/resins or labels permitted. One piece of wrap will be used to wrap a food item which will be supplied by RBKA.

H14) 'HONEYBEE FODDER'. A small display of common flowers in a vase, or arrangement with floral foam, from which the honeybee gathers nectar and pollen. To be staged within a space $30 \mathrm{~cm} \times 30 \mathrm{~cm} \times 30 \mathrm{~cm}$ and judged on assortment, quality and decorative effect. A list of plants must be provided and will be judged as an integral part of the exhibit. NB rare species must not be exhibited.

## AMATEUR PHOTOGRAPHY extra information

New this year, we have updated the competition classes to reflect the increased use of mobile phone cameras. So now, smaller sized photos can be entered in most classes of the competition. This also means that more photos can be printed at home, or cheaply in a shop. But we have retained one large size print class for those who can create detailed images with high specification cameras.

Art and Photography are quite subjective in what we do and don't like; so in order to try and reduce this bias we will have three judges of different ages and sex, instead of just one.

To help you choose your entries, here are the four criteria that will be used to select the winning photos.

- Wow Factor. This is the most important criteria which will be awarded more points than the other criteria. Wow factor is all about impact and making visual attention. It's the measure of a stunning photo. It might tell a story, display an emotion, or capture a moment, but crucially will have a Wow factor.
- Composition. The next most important criteria is all about the parts of the picture and how they relate to each other. This includes the use of positioning, proportion, leading lines, cropping and framing etc. to make a picture that pleases the eye, just looks right or creates interest.
Creativity. This is a measure of; how much thought has been put into the staging of the photo, how the photo has been enhanced when taking it, or afterwards by editing the photo in some way.
- Lighting. This is about the use of light to improve a photo by; enhancing the subject, drawing attention to a part of the photo, or helping the composition.


## Hints for each of the Classes...

Animal Photos - These are often best when the background is right for the animal. Also animals usually look their best when the camera is at the same height as their eyes, but other angles may work too.

Capturing a Memory - This could be a special occasion, event, a day out, a special moment with friends or a special place.

My Best Photo of 2023 - A photo you are particularly proud of, for any reason you like.
Portrait - of an animal and/or human. By including more than just the main subject(s) it can give more of their story. Including relevant objects and backgrounds that are a part of their situation can complete the story.
'Guess the Song' - This works best if it is a very well known song with good visual clues to help people guess which song it is. The Judges will give extra points if they can guess the song title before opening the envelope.

Water - This is a photo of any type of water; sea, pond, puddle, reflections, rain, outdoor or indoors - anything that is wet with water. So there is plenty of scope for a wide interpretation including some creativity in the photo.

Landscape - Traditional picturesque photos, dramatic scenes, as well as modern interpretations - all welcome. Composition often plays a big part in landscapes, to include just the parts that are wanted to create the picture and create depth in the image.

Nature, including macro - Any photo that shows the natural world around us. This includes photos from around the World as well as the UK. Sometimes photos from a different angle create an interesting picture with a good background. (Macro lenses can be used for detailed close-ups).

Black and White - A photo of anything but only in black and white. No colour at all. Taking photos in black and white needs additional consideration on how the grey tones and contrast will look in the final image. Photos can be enhanced in specialist apps and photo editing software.

Movement - A photo that captures movement in one way or another. It can be a photo of something moving or it can be movement created by moving the camera whilst shooting. Including panning with a moving subject for a blurred background. This is a good topic for experimentation to create some impactful photos.

Swallowfield All Saints Churchyard - Take a new photo in the churchyard of All Saints Church in Swallowfield (not inside the church) to capture an interesting photo of something that takes your imagination. Experimentation with different angles and viewpoints can improve the look and composition of a photo. Afterwards, at the Show you will be able to compare your photo with those of the other entries. This 'challenge' has been tried before and has proved to be a rewarding exercise. Submit new photos taken this year.

Low down - A photo taken when holding the camera low down to change the perspective. It can significantly change the look and feel of a photo to create more interest.

Altered Image - This class is for highly edited photos where the editing is the main aspect of the photo and not just to enhance the photo. It can include the use of filters, apps or
advanced editing software like Photoshop to create something new, for fun or for impact, whatever you choose.

Hang on your wall - This is the large sized photo class which is appropriate as the photo is one that you especially like and would hang on a wall in your house.

Photos need to be printed and adhered to a card(board) mount that is slightly larger than the photo. This is to keep the photos flat for the Show display and prevent them from curling.

Small prints up to 7 in $\times 5$ in $/ 18 \mathrm{~cm} \times 13 \mathrm{~cm}$ approx

- for all Classes except "Hang on you Wall"

Large (framed) prints, up to $16 \mathrm{in} \times 24 \mathrm{in} / 41 \mathrm{~cm} \times 60 \mathrm{~cm}$ approx in total

- Only for the "Hang on your Wall" Class

## Insurance and HS\&E Policies

The Society expects that all Traders and Suppliers will have adequate third party and public liability insurance and anticipates that all Traders and Sub-contractors will have carried out their own risk assessments leading to their own Health Safety and Environment Policy. Prior to the event, Traders and Sub Contractors will confirm that they have adequate insurance and are asked to provide details of their standards and approach to Health, Safety and the Environment.

## How to Report an Incident

The Society has implemented procedures that cover incidents, they will be initiated by the Society's Safety Officer. If you discover anything that you consider to be a danger to the Health, Safety or the Environment, please contact the Safety Officer immediately. Any SHS Co-ordinator or Steward will assist in making contact with The Safety Officer.

## Fire

If you discover a fire, evacuate the local area and contact the Safety Officer or Fire Officer immediately. No barbecues are allowed on site without specific authorisation.
